Anne 19, has a heavy workload, and is regularly working, usually alone.



Person 3


- . 1: can play around with, seems relaxing, cute

UX Survey Responses



Response 1: Looks like a box

Response 2: The first thing that comes to mind when I see this device is small desk plants, like succulents. One thing that stands out is the changing colors. Response 3: office desk plants/succulents, flower (windmill/wind turbines), desk lamp, tissue box the function reminds me of fidget spinner or stress relief

What first comes to mind when you see this device?

Response 4: something you can probably find in a Zen meditation class, or like a shelf decor that has multi-functions

Response 5: windmill/dandelion

What first comes to mind when you see this device?

Response 1: I would make the flower be able to grow after blowing breath

Response 2: One thing that I would change is ratio of the size of the base to the plant. Currently, the prototype looks slightly bulky due to the small size of the plant compared to the large base. Also, I think that a circular or square base configuration could more strongly remind users of a plant. I think that the design currently relies on a translucent or transparent base material to show the change of colors. If you end up going with a base that is not translucent, it might be interesting to put slits in or maybe a small section of translucent material to show the light. Also, it would be cool to see if the light could be dispersed evenly/symmetrically across the device. Response 3: the flower (the way it looks), size of the box, add scent function, remote controller (easier way to choose colors, etc)

Response 4: IF I had to change it, I would probably make the plant customizable, with like different flowers or vegetable plants. Like make the Plant portion detachable (or something) such that the user can pick and choose what kind of aesthetic they may like to help them release stress.

Response 5: Probably would use alternative materials, maybe switch to plastic/silicon/bendable wires that swing back and forth

UX Survey Responses -> New Prototype

Key findings to act upon

Finding: Device attractiveness and effectiveness in relieving stress is ambiguous, but people's first impression of the device connects to something calming.

Action: Decreased ratio of plant/base (also based on survey responses), light diffusion altered (from slits in box) (based on preferred material and survey suggestion) (more "intentionally" matches current lighting effect.

Finding: People wanted alternative/
*customizable plant options, similar to previous study responses.

Action: Plants can be inserted through top for customizability, breath is detected with temperature/humidity now vs roly poly before (more reliable + less real estate on top surface

Finding: People primarily prefer a wooden base and green plant color

Action: New prototype is approximately adjusted to meet visual preferences, limited materials for now
